

Headmaster's Foreword



am delighted to make a few words of introduction to our first Yearbook, a treasure of memories that we will look back upon in years to come.

This is a year we shall remember—not for the walls we have built, but for the foundations we have laid. Not for what we have already achieved, but for what we have begun. And like the butterfly who counts not months but moments, we know we have time enough.

Haileybury Bhaluka was not born of comfort or conceit. It was born of conviction. It was born of the belief that the brightest young minds of Bangladesh deserve a school that does not ask how far you can go, but how high you dare to reach. Lifting hearts, empowering minds. Our Yearbook marks the end of our first year and embraces much of what has happened within it.

And at the head of our endeavour, leading the way, is the Haileybury student.

No institute of education — no matter how grand its name or noble its vision—is truly great unless it serves the individual child. Here at Haileybury Bhaluka, we have striven—day by day—to know our students, to call forth what is best within them, and to meet them where they are, before helping them to rise. And rise they have. Within weeks of our opening, we hosted an inaugural art exhibition, 'Whispers of the Soul'. Featuring 40 artworks across a broad canvas of students, we celebrated creativity and artistic talent. We brought the first term to a dramatic close with Haileybury's Got Talent: music and magic, dance and drama; capped by the comedy of Charlie Chaplin, a witty stand-up routine and a scary move with a comic twist. In this first year, we have seen students celebrate their mother tongue on International Language Day with pride and purpose. We honoured International Mother Language Day with a vibrant road painting and a cultural showcase, bringing together the talents of our students and staff. We walk across beautiful tribute to language and heritage, at dawn and at dusk, fostering a sense of unity and cultural appreciation within our community.

We have seen them take their first steps into science with hands-on chemistry experiments—synthesising sulphates and unlocking the hidden language of molecules. These were not ordinary lessons. These were sparks. We have seen then beyond the campus in robotics competitions against university opponents and in online competitions with international schools. We are not afraid to set a high hurdle. We are not ashamed to speak of excellence. For we know that excellence is not arrogance—it is discipline, it is resilience, it is the quiet decision to do one's best, again and again. A relentless quest that will never be realised.

We have witnessed that pursuit in our classrooms and in our competitions. In our Cryptic Crossword Challenge, our students trained their minds to solve problems with wit and logic. In our supervised study, they committed to building lifelong habits of learning. And through these daily acts of effort, they rose. In the Oxford Union Debating Competition, our students took on the rest of the world, the only regional representatives. We do not judge ourselves against other schools in Bangladesh but compare our achievements with the best in the world. As young members of the Council of British International Schools, the Boarding Schools Association, we compare and compete against world class schools. But let it be known that our vision is not narrow. It is wide as the sky and deep as the rivers of Bangladesh. We believe in a curriculum that extends beyond books. We believe in a life of the mind and a life of the spirit. And this year, our students showed us what that means. They led musical ensembles. They performed on stage in Haileybury's Got Talent. They played with courage in football tournaments and triumphed as champions. They showed sportsmanship and strategy in chess. And yes—they lifted their first table tennis trophies with pride and joy.


Let the world know: this is a school that does not simply educate—it illuminates.

We do not measure success by grades alone. We measure it in the quality of our friendships, the depth of our compassion, the strength of our community. In our boarding houses, students have found not just beds and bookshelves—but belonging. In moments of quiet reflection and shared prayer, they have discovered a sense of peace and place. We care for the heart as well as the mind. Our evolving partnership with the children of Shishu Polli Plus, exemplifies our commitment to developing leaders who care for all the people.

Our school was never meant to exist for itself alone. From the beginning, it was meant to serve a greater good. Let us not call our young people only to the pursuit of success—but to the deeper calling of service. Not only to the heights of achievement—but to the foundations of character. And already, they have answered that call. In our eco-clubs and philosophy circles, in the simple kindness they show one another, they are discovering that leadership does not begin with loud commands, but with quiet conviction. Through the Duke of Edinburgh Award, they learn that true accomplishment lies not just in reaching the summit, but in the journey of service, of skill, of volunteering—and yes, of adventure. Just last month, they were trained in food service and visited the school dairy to understand where nourishment begins. Next month, they will carry the spirit of our school across borders, on expedition to Malaysia and Thailand. And next year, with pride and purpose, we begin a new chapter as an accredited IB World School—offering the Diploma Programme to nurture students who are not only open-minded and globally aware, but ready to stand, shoulder to shoulder, with the world they will one day lead.




Pupils of Year 7 with their Tutor Mr. Kanistan Navaratnam & The Headmaster







Year 8 Nutrient Exploration

This term, our Year 8 students have been diving deep into the importance of nutrients and maintaining a balanced diet during their Science lessons. To enhance their understanding, they conducted a practical experiment to test for starch in various food samples using iodine solution.

Key Findings:

Colour Change Observation: The students observed a striking colour change from brown to blue-black, indicating the presence of starch. This hands-on activity not only reinforced their learning about carbohydrates as essential energy sources but also sparked curiosity about the food we consume and its impact on our health.

Benefits of Hands-On Learning:

Experiments like these are crucial in developing scientific skills while encouraging students to explore the world around them. Engaging in practical activities fosters a deeper understanding of the subject matter and promotes a lifelong interest in science.

Year 9 Chemistry in Action

Meanwhile, our Year 9 students have been honing their practical chemistry skills by **synthesizing copper sulfate** through a series of key techniques.

Experiment Overview:

Reaction Initiation: Using copper oxide and sulfuric acid, students initiated a reaction to produce a soluble salt.

Filtration Process: They then filtered the mixture to remove excess solid, ensuring a pure solution.

Crystallisation: Finally, through careful evaporation of the solution, they allowed beautiful blue copper sulfate crystals to form

Learning Outcomes:

This hands-on experiment not only helped students grasp essential separation techniques but also reinforced their understanding of chemical reactions and solubility.


We will have lots of fun activities for students taking place throughout the day including:

It promises to be a great day.










Kicks Off Tomorrow!




Headmaster's Message


The Academic Year 2025-26 begins as follows: boarders return 9 August, teaching begins 10 August. Please find next year's academic calendar in this newsletter.

It is with great pride that the Council of British International Schools (COBIS) certified the achievements of four of our students this week, and an honour to present them in person.







Duke of Edinburgh Award Program: Visit to the dairy farm

As a part of our Duke of Edinburgh Programme we visited a dairy farm which offered a vivid tableau of rural life. The landscape was alive with the gentle movements of livestock, such as herds of cows, a remarkable flock of 118 sheep, and sprightly goats mingled across verdant pastures. Among the animals the presence of playful calves and lambs added a sense of renewal to the scene. Particularly most striking was the formidable cow weighing an impressive 900 kilograms embodying the strength nurtured by traditional farming methods. The peaceful-coexistence of diverse species represented the perfect balance of a working farm where each animal contributes to the vitality of the farm. This significant experience provided a rare glimpse into agricultural life where nature and animal husbandry intertwine to sustain both land and livelihood. We also had the opportunity to ask some reasonable questions to the workers out there, which had helped us to get a better view of the dairy farm and enlighten this amazing experience even more.

A Year in Bangladesh

hen I boarded the plane from the UK to Bangladesh, I had no idea how deeply this country and its people would settle into my heart. It's impossible to summarize such a rich, eventful year, but here are a few moments – snapshots, really – that capture some of the joy, the surprise, and the wonder I've experienced.

Let's begin at Haileybury, with 6am runs through the misty rural landscape, accompanied by colleagues, when the world felt quiet and the paddy fields stretched endlessly around us. These peaceful jogs were often interrupted only by the odd goat, birdsong, and once (later in the year when we'd upgraded to two wheels) an elephant pulling logs that almost knocked me and Mr. Kanistan off our bikes!

Locally, one of the most surprisingly special moments came at the Bhaluka Post Office, where a simple attempt to send a letter to the UK turned into a full-staff operation. It was the first time the office had ever handled international mail and it resulted in a small act of connection that sparked a lot of laughter and camaraderie and one of my favourite photos of the year.

Moving further afield, it has been a privilege to explore Bangladesh's historical and cultural richness, usually in the excellent company of Mr Chris. We ventured to Ahsan Manzil and Lalbagh Fort in Old Dhaka – both breathtaking (though Old Dhaka's winding chaos did test my navigation skills). A weekend in Mymensingh offered peaceful moments by the sacred river, art at the gallery, and the romance of Shashi Lodge: an architectural gem. We even made friends with a rickshaw driver who seemed to appear just when we needed him, like magic. It was in Mymensingh, too, that I tasted fushka for the first time – a moment of culinary love at first bite! In Chittagong, there was terror (the giant swing at Foy's Lake), delight (watching red crabs scuttle across the shore), and curiosity (peering into the morning seafood catch being haggled over by locals). The Ethnological Museum and Baatighar Bookshop were also unexpected delights and definitely ones to arranges student trips to next year.

Christmas took us on an unforgettable tour under the gracious guidance of the exceptional Mr Nasir. In Rajshahi, he showed us the real Bangladesh – from Tagore's peaceful holiday home to the stunning Rajshahi Museum, home to androgynous figures and a serene standing Buddha. I was honoured to speak at the Rajshahi Fine Arts Department, where students were exhibiting world-class sculpture; we climbed palms for fresh date juice on a memorable misty morning; visited fisheries where fish rose from the depths to sample our breakfast offerings; sat on cushions listening to musicians perform soul-stirring pieces of traditional and modern music, and; visited the Sopura Silk Mill, where we met some of the most talented and friendly craftspeople I've ever encountered. In Khulna, we spotted a crocodile in the Sundarbans, played chess with local children, and tried to fish by throwing nets. I caught... a shrimp (no, not the one in the photo – that was Mr Chris' - mine was almost invisible).



Dhaka, of course, has been a regular adventure. From learning Bangla calligraphy at an art fair to receiving my first gifted artwork - two joyful bulbuls painted by a local artist at Cezanne Gallery - it has felt like a city that gives and gives. Thanks to Mr. Rahat, I toured Dhaka University, saw the parliament building, and, with Mr Kanistan, cheered on our students in a robotics competition. This remains a moment of pride (we won't say anything about the robot not getting off the starting line...). Thanks are also due to the stalwart Mr. Aminul for graciously inviting Mr Kanistan and I to watch sports at the American School. It was a pleasurable afternoon, though nothing (nothing!) compares to watching our boys play: football, badminton, ping pong, whatever it is, they play with heart and skill. Watching the badminton tournament has to be one of my top five happy memories of this year.

Then there's the wildlife: our lost pipistrelle, a delicate, fragile grounded swift, a bee swarm the size of a suitcase outside poor Mr. Chris' window, the countless insects and reptiles spotted during morning jogs. It would be hard to say whether I have been more pleased by students who have come to tell me what they are reading or students who have bought me injured animals to help look after (and the occasional dead butterfly to add to my lepidopterist collection). The world around us is fascinating and beautiful and engaging with it fully is part of our joyful journey as human beings.

Can I include the infamous Dhaka traffic in that sense of fascination? Hmm, not so much... though I'll never forget the time I looked out from the back of the car in a traffic jam and locked eyes with a disgruntled cow in the back of a truck. Make that five cows, close enough for their dribble to land on my window. Mind you, *I did once drive a CNG down the school drive*, so *I can officially say I've been a Bangladeshi driver* (for 200 metres, anyway) and that really was joyful.

This school has been a family. Our newest staff – Mr. Saifur and Mr. Mahedu – have slotted in perfectly. Mr. Saifur, my classroom neighbour, has provided endless humour on a busy day, while Mr. Wahid, a pillar of the school, has never ceased to inspire with his dedication and commitment to his students. I've paid homage already to Mr Nasir and Mr Aminal's kindness in sharing experiences with us expats, and Mr Kanistan knows that I couldn't have made it through this year without his humouring my constant 'invitations' to do exercise.

Though I want to give a teacher's perspective here, it would be remiss of me not to also give a special shout out to the women of the school, with whom I shared a hilarious afternoon filming a promo video. Clever, kind, and endlessly funny, these unsung heroes deserve a note of thanks. As for Mr Simon, Mr Masum, Mr Burhan, Capt. Asif and Mr Al Amin: the school simply would not work without them. They want the best for you and toil every day to make that possible.

Of course, at the heart of it all is you: the student body. Each of you has made this year one of the best in my teaching career. Whether it has been the Year 7s diving into *A Series of Unfortunate Events* (giving me another welcome reason to go to The Bookworm), the Year 8s astonishing me with their ever-expanding vocabularies, the Year 9s helping their new students feel integrated, or the Year 10s managing their IGCSE journey with grit – you've made me so proud. You've shared poems, jokes, questions, frustrations, and joys, and some of you have truly turned yourselves around this year. Oh and let me just say: no one has ever sung me a better Happy Birthday!

Thank you, Bangladesh. Thank you, team. Thank you, students. This has been a year of magic – and I can't wait to see you all in six weeks, after a summer of well-earned rest.
